

Respond to the prompts in one page (or more). If needed, conduct research to obtain additional facts to support your analyses.

- 2. What did he know and understand?

- 4. Find someone in the news whose skills, knowledge and disposition are well suited to the task he/she has taken on.

- 1. On the newspaper's weather or other map, draw the route that the Blue Ridge Parkway takes. Write in the names of the towns on the route. Look for newspapers that serve the towns in the listing of online newspapers with links at www.ncpress.com (NCPA). Do you find references to the Blue Ridge Parkway in those papers?
- 2. What roads and/or other transportation systems make news?
- 3. From reading daily newspapers and searching newspaper archives, what do you learn about the responsibilities (and challenges) of the NC Department of Transportation? When searching newspaper archives, type in the names of roads that you drive. Also, use key words, such as: gas tax, toll roads, road construction, interstate highways and the names of individuals who manage or make decisions about roads and highways in NC. What strategies in your search give you effective results?
- 4. What is tourism? What economic impact does tourism have? What tourism benefits your area? In your newspaper, find references to people, places and events that attract tourists or visitors.
- 5. In the news, who is working to benefit the state? How?
- 6. Write a tribute to Browning that might have appeared on the editorial page after his death. Search newspapers and/or newspaper archives for essays that salute individuals whose efforts improved their community, region or state.
