'Frankenstorm' and The Lost Colony

The Perfect Storm

Introduction to the task:

In 1588 a great storm, perhaps a 'perfect storm' changed both European history and North Carolina history. At the time, England, under the rule of Elizabeth I of England, and Spain, under the rule of Philip, II were in a power struggle for control of the wealth that had recently been discovered in the New World. The Spanish had a huge fleet of ships, called the Spanish Armada, and the Armada was considered the 'cutting edge' fleet of the time. When Philip II decided to invade England, to establish Spain's power once and for all, Elizabeth commandeered all 'ships of the realm' meaning even the smallest vessels were seized by the English navy to fight the Spanish Armada. Because all ships were conscripted into the English navy, John White, the governor of the Roanoke Colony, was unable to secure a ship in which to deliver critical supplies to the colony in North Carolina. Consequently, the colony on Roanoke was lost. The overall outcome for England, however, was successful because a great storm brewed in the waters around England, and the powerful Spanish Armada was destroyed by the storm. The Spanish ships were huge and clumsy while the smaller, more agile English ships were able to maneuver out of the storm's path.

Rubric:

- Use MLA or other approved format in your presentation.
- Be sure to create a graphic organizer to plan your response.
- Cite at least five sources in your response. Include internal citations where appropriate.
- Employ progressive logic/logical coherence in your responding argument.
- Argue respectfully, yet forcefully.
- Use standard writing conventions: language usage and mechanics.
- If you are preparing a digital response, include illustrations, photos, if possible, giving credits where needed. Consult with your instructor about the format of your response.
- Collaborate on the research and enjoy the benefits of teamwork.
